BIB5003 New Testament Overview – History and Literature of Early Christians

A study of the background, history and emphases of New Testament documents as they relate to the development and theology of the early church recorded in Acts.

Course Specifics:

This course is 8 weeks in length for 3 units of credit.

Cost: \$300 tuition plus textbooks (estimated \$70)

2. Introducing The New Testament by Mark Allan Powell
3. The Shadow of the Galilean: The Quest of the Historical Jesus in Narrative Form by Gerd Theissen

If you will be participating for graded Credit:

This SALT course will consist of lectures with PowerPoint, online discussions, readings, written assignments, and extensive learning resources. A minimum of 15 hours per week including class time and course work is required for those seeking to earn college credit. Students who enroll in a course for credit are required to complete all readings and assignments, and they will have a final grade recorded on their University transcript.

This course is transferrable to all undergraduate and graduate degrees at Hope International University and likely to transfer to other accredited Bible colleges. If you wish to audit this course:
